We demonstrate this in our work delivering the DMU Global programme, and also through our continued growth and diversification of global partnerships.

This report highlights the work of our Global Mobility Office working in cooperation with colleagues across DMU to build and strengthen our partnerships in the field of student mobility. These partnerships allow us to deliver a wide range of international activity for the benefit of our students, and we would like to thank our global network for being part of these successes.

Alongside our significant institutional commitment to offering inclusive international experiences through our DMU Global programme, we are an active participant in the Turing Scheme, and we fully embraced the global nature of the programme which allows us to deliver an even more diverse range of opportunities in cooperation with our global network of partners. The programme allows us to send large numbers of students abroad to study, work and volunteer, and we are excited to see how this programme develops, alongside the potential re-association with the Erasmus+ programme in future years.

Our work plays a key role in DMU's strategic goals by enhancing and expanding our global partnerships, articulated in the 'Partnerships with Purpose' strand of our institutional strategy, 'The Empowering University.'

I hope this report brings to life the fantastic work of the Global Mobility Office in managing global partnerships, and delivering life-changing opportunities that benefit DMU students.

Strategy and mission

Within DMU's Partnerships with Purpose strand of the wider institutional strategy we articulate our commitment to international education and student mobility partnerships. Our focus is on growing global partnerships [...] that will provide the university with a global footprint.

These partnerships enable our students to access international opportunities and networks. Our aim is to work with our overseas partners to support students to gain international experiences through programmes such as the Turing scheme and DMU Global.

Locally, DMU Global's objectives align with and support the aforementioned University targets. In particular, through our global partnerships our vision is to make international experiences accessible to all DMU students, to support their learning, growth and development.

Our global partnerships help us to deliver our aims which include:

- Enhancing academic study and the student experience through overseas experiential learning.
- Collaborating with universities globally to develop partnerships to support student exchange and Turing Scheme mobilities.
- Supporting our students to develop a range of key skills as a result of their international experiences, equipping them with the tools and knowledge to be successful in a global workplace and society.



Our global footprint

DMU Global manages a diverse range of **60 student mobility partnerships globally**. This includes links with universities across Europe, which remain strong and continue the legacy of the Erasmus+ programme.

In addition, over the past 5 years we have significantly expanded our footprint in Canada and the United States to respond to student demand, with us now having 16 partnerships in North America.

Similarly, we have recently grown our global partnerships in Asia to satisfy interest in both full year study programmes as well as summer schools in destinations such as South Korea and Japan primarily, but also Hong Kong, China and Thailand. In total we have 13 student mobility partnerships in the Asian region.

Partnership development

We are committed to developing a global network of exchange partners, that foster mobility opportunities on a reciprocal basis. Annually we review the performance of our current partnerships and identify potential areas for growth and development, with the aim of creating new, sustainable partnerships with ambitious and prestigious institutions from around the world. When building new partnerships, we look for links with institutions that...

- Have a reputation for academic quality, and innovative pedagogy.
- Offer programmes and modules that complement and expand the learning experiences for our students.
- Offer an excellent exchange experience, complemented by highquality welfare and student support.
- Are located in a range of unique and exciting destinations where our students would be interested in living and studying.

Over the 2024-25 academic year we continued to diversify and expand our partnership network, adding the following exchange partners to our offer:



Ball State University Muncie, Indiana, USA

Founded in 1918, Ball State University is a public research institution offering over 120 undergraduate majors and 100 graduate programs. Known for immersive learning and innovation, it serves more than 20,000 students across seven academic colleges. The university emphasizes handson education, research, and community engagement, with a strong reputation in architecture, business, and education.



Hosei University Tokyo, Japan

Founded in 1880 as a law school, Hosei University is a prestigious private research university in Tokyo, recognized for its global outlook and academic excellence. It offers programs across 15 faculties and 38 departments, including Englishtaught degrees in global studies, business, and sustainability. A member of Japan's Top Global University Project, Hosei hosts over 30,000 students and 1,500 international learners.



Suan Sunandha Rajabhat University Bangkok, Thailand

Suan Sunandha Rajabhat University, established in 1940 and upgraded to university status in 2004, is a leading public institution in Bangkok's historic Dusit district. Originally a royal garden, it now serves 20,000+ students with programs in education, management, arts, science, and technology. SSRU emphasizes cultural heritage, practical skills, and global integration, offering exchange opportunities and language support for international students.



University of South Alabama Mobile, Alabama, USA

Established in 1963, the University of South Alabama is a comprehensive public research university located along the Gulf Coast. It enrols nearly 14,000 students and offers programs through ten colleges, including medicine, nursing engineering, and business.

ISEP membership

The 2024-25 academic year saw DMU join International Student Exchange Programme (ISEP), a not-for-profit organisation that brings together a consortium of universities around the world, to make studying abroad more accessible to DMU students. Being a member of ISEP allows DMU students to study at over 100 universities in the US.

The model of ISEP works on the basis of reciprocal exchange. Students pay fees (such as accommodation and a meal stipend) to their home university, with a student from within the ISEP network taking their place. This means that it will cost a DMU student about the same cost to study abroad as it would to study at DMU.

Looking forward, we hope to build on what has been a successful inaugural year with ISEP. Initial feedback from students has been positive, with participants reporting they like the fixed cost and guaranteed accommodation. We continue to raise the profile of ISEP with student information sessions and advising. Membership contributes to our ambitions of increasing the number of students who spend a year studying abroad through vastly increasing the capacity in the US – the most popular destination for DMU students.

Four DMU students are currently spending the 25-26 academic year studying on exchange through ISEP at institutions in Georgia, Maryland and Massachusetts.



Incoming students are not limited to the US, meaning ISEP is creating a more diverse incoming student body. In 25-26 we have students joining from France, New Zealand, US, South Korea and Argentina.



Representation and networking

A key component of our partnership management and development work involves engaging with colleagues, peers and partners nationally and internationally. Our Global Mobility Office is an active member of a range of networks and organisations, with the aim of facilitating and creating new partnerships and opportunities for our students.

Over the past 12 months DMU was represented in the following international forums:



EAIE 2024

DMU attended this European conference held in Toulouse, France in September 2024 which gathered over 7,300 participants from 110 countries to explore the future of international higher education The purpose of the event was foster relationships with key student mobility partners based in Europe.



NAFSA 2025

DMU was represented at the annual conference held between 27-30 May 2025 in San Diego. The event gathered 10,000 student mobility professionals from over 100 countries. We were able to meet and engage with existing partners, and develop new links as a result of the conference.

In addition to our international representation, DMU has been actively involved in UK networks, which foster collaboration and best practice sharing. These networks and groups include:



Universities UK International (UUKi)

The international arm of Universities UK, representing UK universities globally. We have engaged with its Outward Mobility Network, annual Global Mobility Conference, Internationalisation at Home working group, and represented on its Climate Action Working Group.



British Universities Transnational Exchange Association (BUTEX)

DMU is a member of this organisation, which supports student mobility and international education. We were represented at the Annual Conference and delivered two sessions for practitioners sharing best practice.



HEURO (The Association of UK Higher Education European Officers)

We are a member of this UK-based organisation for professionals working in international education within higher education. It includes over 100 institutions.



East Midlands Mobility Network (EMMN)

DMU is a founding member of this regional collaboration among universities in the East Midlands focused on student mobility, internationalisation, or widening participation. We organised and hosted an event on campus in summer 2025 for members.

Turing Scheme

The Turing Scheme is the UK Government's global mobility programme that funds opportunities for studying and working abroad. DMU Global submits and secures bids annually, enabling our students to participate in international experiences lasting between four weeks and twelve months.

Most UK universities submit bids and receive funding through the scheme. The scheme aims to develop students' skills and boost employability through international experiences, with a strong emphasis on advancing social justice by making these opportunities accessible to all.



Did vou know?

Since the launch of the Turing Scheme in 2021, DMU Global have **secured over £1.5 million in funding**, which is awarded directly to DMU students to remove financial barriers associated with going overseas.

In 2024-25, we were **awarded £525,000 in Turing Scheme funding**. This funding enabled 88 students to undertake overseas experiences, with 85% of participants coming from underrepresented backgrounds. Additional funding was also available to support these students who were identified as qualify as a widening participation student. The funding was allocated as follows:

- £200,000 supported students with accommodation and daily living costs while overseas.
- Over £50,000 was awarded to students from widening participation backgrounds to cover return travel costs.
- Nearly £20,000 was reimbursed to students from disadvantaged backgrounds for travel-related expenses such as visas, passports, and insurance.
- Full financial support was provided for any adjustments or additional support required by students with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND).
- The average total funding per student in 2024/25 was £3,065.

This funding facilitated a wide range of engagements and strengthened our collaboration with international partners. Highlights include:



34 DMU students studied on exchange for a full academic year at partners in Europe, North America, and Asia.



Our first ever student studied at our newest Japanese partner, Seinan Gakuin University.



30 students attended language and culture summer schools at 4 different partner universities



10 students participated in workbased experiences overseas
















DMU Global partner engagement

Leveraging our branch campuses and Transnational Education (TNE) partnerships, DMU Global was able to deliver a wide range of opportunities to strategic locations and partners in 2024-25.

There are currently over 10,000 students now studying for a DMU award in places as far afield as Denmark, Vietnam, Hong Kong, Sri Lanka, and the Philippines, with established campus operations in Dubai, Kazakhstan and Cambodia. Through these partnerships, we were able to create mobility opportunities for DMU Leicester students, bringing them into contact with their peers overseas, encouraging intercultural exchange whilst also strengthening our global partnerships.
