FOREWORD

The past academic year has been very much one of building back better for the Global Mobility Office at DMU. With two years of activity significantly impacted by the COVID-19 Pandemic, there were green shoots of hope for our team, in terms of the resumption of travel, and more generally re-engaging with DMU students.

We took all the lessons from the past few years, and combined them with what we already knew about how to run a successful student mobility programme, and I feel that we have come out of the situation wiser, more resilient and prepared to handle present and future challenges.

Whilst this report perhaps doesn't have the large number of students travelling to all corners of the world to boast about, the successes are subtler, but no less meaningful. The work and preparation that has gone into running 20 trips, alongside countless online and on-campus opportunities and the continuation of our student exchange activity has been more significant than even we could have predicted.

We hope that our annual report tells a compelling story of the past year, sharing the successes of students and staff at DMU who have engaged with and benefited from international experiences offered through the DMU Global programme at a time of transition and change.

SUMMARY

With the return of travel, DMU Global adapted to various challenges and continued to deliver meaningful international experiences for DMU Students. In fact, after taking part 94% of participants cited that they would recommend DMU Global opportunities to other students.

Through increased student and staff support, various changes in relation to COVID-19 and the continued innovation of virtual international experiences, more than **750 students participated** in our opportunities in **2021-22**.

Student Feedback

International experiences are very important to DMU students. They are interested in new experiences overseas, improving their intercultural awareness and developing networks. Some of the key student feedback included:

92%

of participants were satisfied with their experience

92%

felt the opportunity enhanced their studies and overall experience at DMU 87%

felt their experience was good value for money

As a result of taking part, students developed skills such as their ability to handle new and unfamiliar situations, their understanding of different cultures as well as their awareness of global issues. 82% are now also more interested in future international experiences at DMU.

Student Exchange

DMU students worked or studied abroad in 14 different countries, with **USA**, **Spain** and the **Netherlands** the most popular destinations. After studying or working abroad for a year:



CONTEXT



COVID-19

Student mobility and international travel are amongst the slowest to recover from the Pandemic. Entry, testing and vaccination requirements for countries globally have been fluid and ever-changing, making planning more challenging. Whilst Europe and North America began to open up to us to deliver overseas opportunities from January 2022, other parts of the world such as Asia remained closed.



Travel industry

A knock-on effect of the Pandemic was disarray and chaos at times in the travel industry. With staffing levels not meeting the demand for travel, expertise in the industry was lost and supply chains were disrupted. Everything that we knew about travel in the past was not the same now. Greater levels of patience and contingency planning were necessary for almost every trip.



Climate crisis

With a growing sense of global urgency to address the climate crisis, all industries and individuals are taking action to reduce their impact on the environment. In the field of student mobility, universities have taken steps to reduce their carbon emissions and find more sustainable ways of achieving internationalisation.



Financial challenges

Both at DMU and in wider society there are financial challenges posed by the Pandemic and the cost of living crisis that have affected our activity. Needing to do more with less against a backdrop of increased costs has meant that the DMU Global has needed to adapt.



OUR RESPONSE

Whilst the aforementioned issues may seem daunting and, in some respects, out of our control, our approach was to adapt and do our best to overcome these, by adapting our activity in a number of ways:



Developing our virtual international experiences

With the challenges faced, we embraced the concept of virtual international experiences. A greener, more inclusive and accessible model for internationalisation, Virtual opportunities continued to offer us an alternative even when travel was available. For the second year of activity we supported a range of academic projects, virtual courses, and conferences and virtual internships for DMU students to engage in.



COVID-19 changes

Despite the return of travel, COVID-19 continued to pose challenges. We made a number of changes to our activity to ensure that students and staff were informed and safe when travelling. Changes included insurance coverage, travel guidance for students, changes to group travel bookings and improvements to our incident management policies and processes.



Student and staff support

Recognising that student and staff travel had been paused for two years, we took steps to educate and prepare our students and staff. We launched new online training modules related to health & safety and risk management, revamped our pre-departure sessions, and also relaunched our widening participation funding for students travelling overseas.



OVERSEAS TRIPS

The resumption of overseas trips was delayed due to ongoing travel restrictions associated with the COVID-19 Pandemic. However, DMU Global were able to pilot the resumption of trips between April and August 2022.





STUDENT FEEDBACK

We invited 161 overseas trip participants to share feedback about their experiences, from which 89 responded (56% response rate). Here is what they had to say...

STUDENT EXCHANGE

Every year DMU Global offers students the chance to spend a year studying or working abroad as part of their degree, with the experience part-funded by the Erasmus+ programme and Turing Scheme.

In 2021-22, **54 DMU students** spent the year **studying (39) and working (15)** overseas.

Looking ahead to the upcoming academic year, **DMU secured £239,400 of Turing Scheme funding** to support year-long study and work experiences with a particular focus on removing barriers for students from a widening participation background.



ON-CAMPUS AND ONLINE INTERNATIONAL EXPERIENCES

Complementing our overseas activity, DMU Global continued to offer a combination of online and on-campus international activities to students throughout the 2021-22 academic year.

On-campus

Most activities returned to in-person delivery this year, which was welcomed by students who fed back that in the case of language classes learning as a group was more beneficial. In total we engaged the following the number of students across our campus-based activity...



Languages

212 students studied a language through DMU Global. The breakdown by language was as follows:

- Arabic: 25

Cultural Awareness

Online

Continuing our commitment to offer virtual international experiences as an alternative to overseas travel, DMU Global organised a range of opportunities in the 2021-22 academic year. **In total, close to 150 DMU students participated in our virtual experiences, which included:**



Virtual Internships

15 DMU students completed virtual internships with our partner ThinkPacific, supporting a range of projects in Fiji linked to the UN SDGs



DMU academic staff in Nursing and Criminology delivered COIL/virtual exchange projects with partner universities in Japan and USA respectively, engaging 29 students.



Online refugee course

In cooperation with DMU Local, **13 students** participated in a 6-week course learning about the refugee crisis in the UK and overseas.



Employability webinars

Delivered by our partner Pagoda Projects, **12 students** attended a variety of webinars related to employability related topics.



Global citizenship programmes

Through a range of programmes delivered with partners including Common Purpose, **57 students** benefited from learning activities related to global citizenship and the UN SDGs.



Cultural exchanges

20 students took part in cultural exchange projects with students from universities in Japan and China.

SECTOR ENGAGEMENT AND SUCCESSES

We have always seen DMU Global as a sector lead in the field of internationalisation, and over the past year we have continued to share our expertise with colleagues globally, and we have actively participated participate in networks, evidenced by the following...

- A DMU Global blog submission for Universities UK International (UUKi) titled 'You can't create virtual exchange overnight: what we have learnt from moving international experiences online' which aimed to share lessons learned in relation to developing virtual mobility opportunities.
- Delivering a presentation on DMU Global's sustainability initiatives to other UK universities for the IC Global Café and submitting a case study to Climate Action Network for International Educators (CANIE) knowledge hub.
- Being featured in the UUKi's report 'How the climate crisis affects internationalisation' as the sole case study of good practice from a student mobility perspective.
- Presenting a session to the international mobility community at the British Universities Transnational Exchange annual conference, focussing on the importance of virtual and oncampus internationalisation as an alternative way of achieving intercultural learning.

DMU Global has been recognised as a finalist in this category for its innovative response to the COVID-19 pandemic and climate crisis, which includes attempts to reduce our carbon footprint, educate students and staff about sustainability, and the introduction of 'greener' virtual international experiences that encourage meaningful online collaboration with partners and students globally.



LOOKING AHEAD

Our planning cycles within DMU Global always mean that by the time this annual report is published, work is already well and truly underway to deliver the 2022-23 programme of activity. Our overarching aims for the year are to significantly upscale activity (especially overseas trips), and also to reconnect with our student body in a meaningful way, making them more aware of the benefits of international experiences.

To achieve our aims of offering more international experiences and re-engaging with students, our key strategic objectives for the upcoming year are to:

- Deliver an increased number and range of academic and extracurricular overseas experiences for DMU students that enhance studies, and support the development of a range of key skills valued by employers
- Solution of Grow and diversify the range and scope of opportunities for students to study or work abroad as part of the Turing Scheme, whilst building meaningful relationships with strategic global partner universities to deliver these experiences.
- Develop the cultural awareness and language skills of DMU students through the delivery of a range of inclusive and low-cost campus-based international experiences
- Continue the development and evolution of DMU Global Online

 Learning, embracing virtual international experiences as a way to offer scalable, inclusive and cost-effective opportunities for DMU students.
