Thank you to everyone who works with us, we hope to cooperate for many years to come!



### Summary

DMU Global successfully provided a full year of international experiences for DMU students, with an impressive 93% of participants signalling that they'd recommend our opportunities to fellow students.

Through enhanced support for both students and staff, along with numerous innovations and a commitment to making experiences accessible to all, we proudly enabled 1,260 students to participate in our opportunities during 2023-24.

#### **Student Feedback**

A significant 81% of participants believe that international experiences are an important part their time at DMU. These students are keen on exploring new overseas opportunities, developing their intercultural skills, and building networks. Here are some of the main takeaways from their feedback:

### **Student Exchange**

DMU students worked or studied abroad in 13 different countries, and following their year abroad:

93%

felt more employable as a result

93%

felt the experience enhanced their studies 86%

would now like to work internationally

As a result of participating, students not only **met new people**, but also felt a **stronger connection to the university**. They **developed transferable skills** such as:

- Confidence
- Adaptability
- ✓ Understanding of different cultures
- Managing unfamiliar situations.

Encouragingly, **87% are now more interested in future international experiences at DMU**.



# Overseas Trips

Throughout the academic year, DMU Global offered a comprehensive range of overseas opportunities and experienced a steady 15% increase in student participation. Encouragingly, 83% felt the opportunity enhanced their studies at DMU.



### Why did students take part?



# Student Exchange

Every year DMU Global offers students the chance to spend a year studying or working abroad as part of their degree, with the experience funded by the Turing Scheme. In 2023-24, 42 DMU students spent the year studying (28) or working (14) overseas.

Student feedback demonstrates that studying or working abroad helps develop skills, knowledge and values.

One of the greatest challenges I encountered was the idea of living abroad by myself, without any family or friends nearby, and not knowing what to expect. I overcame this by building a strong support network of new friends and mentors, immersing myself in the local culture, and staying connected with my loved ones back home through regular communication. This experience not only made me more independent and resilient but also enriched my life in ways I could never have imagined.

Looking ahead to the upcoming academic year, **DMU** secured £525,00 of Turing Scheme funding (an increase of £200,000) to support study, work and volunteering experiences, with a particular focus on removing barriers for students from widening participation backgrounds.



# On-campus & Virtual Experiences

Complementing our overseas activity, DMU Global continued to offer a robust combination of low cost and accessible virtual and on-campus international activities to students.

### Key highlights

477

participated in on-campus and virtual experiences



- Languages: 170 students studied languages including: Arabic (13), French (37), German (27), Japanese (47) and Spanish (45).
- Mandarin: 155 students studied with the Confucius Institute.
- > Intercultural Awareness Course: 17 students participated in DMU Global's bespoke Intercultural skills course.



- Olobal Citizenship Programme: 10 students participated in a programme exploring global citizenship and UN SDGs.
- Teach English as a Foreign Language (TEFL): 76 students participated in a TEFL online course to help them learn how to teach English to non-native speakers.
